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AECM PROGRAM UPDATE

A message from Dr. Becky Haddad AECM Lecturer

Spring has sprung and we're growing as much as ever! As the world reminds us of a continuous cycle of growth and regeneration, we're excited to reflect on the ways we're #UMNProud of our majors, our students, and our thriving programs.



This year brought some return to normalcy as we welcomed students back to campus for a variety of Agricultural Education, Communication and Marketing (AECM) courses. Being back on campus meant capitalizing on the use of our new CHS classroom spaces, allowing us to explore options to implement additional offerings to students not traditionally served by AECM majors. We're excited to offer brand-new minors in Agricultural & Food Education (AFE) and Agricultural & Environmental Science Communication (AESC) starting Fall 2022. We've also expanded our offerings to include Curriculum for Agri-Science Educators (CASE) for our preservice teachers. Initiatives remain underway to offer graduate licensure in Work-Based Learning and distance options for graduate licensure in Agricultural Education. Our facilities have also seen immense development in the Agriculture Mechanics arena. Under Lee Thompson, we've seen growth in both equipment and facilities, including classroom space and virtual welders.

In addition to growth in the classroom, our students saw immense success with conferencing back on their schedule. Ag Ed students Amelia Hayden, Kaiya Novacek, and Anna Buckentine represented the University of Minnesota at the Alpha Tau Alpha (ATA) conclave in conjunction with the National FFA Convention. They brought home awards in Quiz Bowl (first), Program of Excellence (third), and the fundraising component of Program of Excellence (first). AECM students Kelsey Biel, Karli Knopf, Nicole Koziolek, and Isabelle Patterson earned their American FFA Degree this fall, and Dr. Amy Smith and Lavyne Rada received their Honorary American FFA Degrees. Agricultural Communication and Marketing students are preparing for their yearly competitions coming up this April and June.

The National Agri-Marketing Association (NAMA) Team recently submitted their executive summary for review and are preparing their marketing plan pitch for this year's product Oculis 103°, a thermal and motion-

detecting camera and software management system that alerts pork producers when a sow is beginning to farrow. Members of our Agricultural Communicators of Tomorrow (ACT) Club are preparing their submissions to this year's Critique and Contest to be held at the Agricultural Media Summit in Raleigh, North Carolina this summer.

Growth also manifested in opportunities to engage with our community of stakeholders. In addition to attending conferences, we've been able to grow in our outreach. AECM Partnership and Outreach Coordinator Illana Livstrom leads Ag Teacher's IDEAS (Inclusion, Diversity, and Equity in Ag Ed) aiding teachers in diversity and inclusion efforts locally and statewide. In addition, the AgriCast platform has been a great way to support stakeholders with content and resources. Our focus over the past few years has been with online delivery, but we are now getting back to face-to-face workshops and outreach. This semester we are developing and rolling out a new workshop series promoting digital media skills and showcasing AECM opportunities at the University of Minnesota. In addition to developing the AgriCast platform and supporting innovative communication technologies across our department, Dr. Troy McKay has been in classrooms, sharing the opportunities available in AECM at the University of Minnesota. Our student teachers, Amelia Hayden, Anna Buckentine, Kaiya Novacek, Max Johnson, and Aleesha Gilbertson were also in classrooms this spring, and we're grateful to their cooperating teachers and sites for their support in growing our next generation of agricultural educators.

The University of Minnesota National Agri-Marketing Association (NAMA) is a student organization within CFANS that offers students real-world and applicable experience in agricultural marketing and communication. This is accomplished through students developing a product within food, agriculture or natural resources that focuses on benefitting producers or consumers, and then developing a robust marketing plan for promoting said product.



Each year, student NAMA members from across the country compete at the annual student marketing competition to present about their product and the materials they have developed for its marketing purposes. At this competition and the months of preparation leading up to it, students gain applicable skills in research, analysis, creativity, time management, public speaking and networking, and the work completed in NAMA can be directly applied to a future career in agri-marketing.

Our student NAMA chapter also has the unique opportunity to network and collaborate with our North Central NAMA chapter, which is the professional affiliate chapter in the Twin Cities composed of marketing and communication professionals who typically work in marketing agencies and on corporate brands. We are very grateful for their support and expertise and look forward to fostering this relationship between student and professional NAMA for years to come.



In April, our student chapter was very excited to attend the first in-person student marketing competition in over three years in Kansas City, Missouri. The student marketing competition is part of the overall Agri-Marketing Conference that takes place annually for NAMA professionals. This year, our chapter developed a product called Oculis 103°, which is a thermal and motion-detecting camera and software management system made for the purpose to detect farrowing in sows and prevent piglet loss from unattended births. Our team, which included Ashley Hagenow, Sydney Hendel, Karli Knopf, Olivia Loveless, Matthew Strobel and Suzanna Viau presented our product at this year's competition and were proud to represent the University of Minnesota.

While our team did not make it past the preliminary round of competition, it was a great learning experience for our chapter, and we all took great notes to apply toward next year! Additionally, Ashley Hagenow was recognized as the recipient of the Successful Farming/Fergie Ferguson Scholarship offered through the NAMA Foundation. Congratulations to all participants and award winners at this year's NAMA Conference and we are excited for what next year will bring!






2022 TEACHER CANDIDATES




